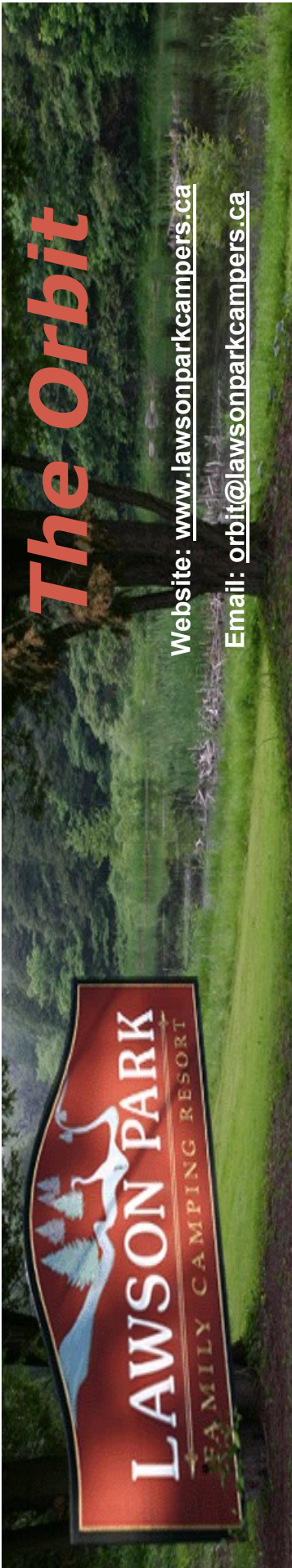

Carbon Monoxide Alarms

It is now the law in Ontario to install carbon monoxide (CO) alarms in your home if you have fuel-burning appliances or an attached garage.

The Ontario Fire Code was amended October 15, 2014 to require CO alarms (Bill 77—Hawkins Gignac Act.)

Single-family homeowners of residential buildings that contain no more than six suites have until April 15, 2015 to comply with the law.

CO is produced when fuels such as propane, gasoline, natural gas, heating oil, coal or wood do not burn completely in fuel-burning appliances. These include furnaces, hot water heaters, stoves, barbecues, portable fuel-burning heaters, generators and vehicles.

In 2014, there was at least one (1) incident of carbon monoxide poisoning from a malfunctioning appliance at Lawson Park

Also check that all outside appliance vents are not blocked.

Exposure to CO can cause flu-like symptoms such as headaches, nausea, dizziness, as well as confusion, drowsiness, loss of consciousness and death.

If your CO alarm sounds, and you or other occupants suffer from symptoms of CO poisoning, get everyone out of the home immediately. Then call 911.

If your CO alarm sounds, and no one is suffering from symptoms of CO poisoning, check to see if the battery needs replacing, or the alarm has reached its “end-of-life” detection before calling 911.

Know the sound of your CO alarm.

Your CO alarm sounds different than your smoke alarm. Test both alarms monthly and make sure everyone in your home knows the difference between the two alarm sounds.

Typical Example CO Alarms

A CO alarm that has a digital display and contains a lifetime battery. This alarm has a 10 Year Limited Warranty. It has an AC adapter built in which can be removed to enhance the installation properties. These retail in the \$36 to \$45 range at popular retail outlets.

This alarm is a CO alarm with the ability to detect the presence of Propane and/or Natural Gas. It is AC or contains a 9 volt battery backup. It has a 5 year Limited Warranty. This unit retails for about \$60 at popular retail outlets

NOTIFYING EMERGENCY SERVICES

Do you know how to contact Emergency Services. If you have a Bell Canada, wireline telephone, it is likely that if you dial 911 you will be connected to the Hamilton 911 Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP).

If you depend on a cellular telephone, when you dial 911, confirm that you have reached the Hamilton 911 PSAP. Otherwise, your call may be delayed.

If you use VoIP or services that use an internet phone service, Confirm that you have reached the Hamilton PSAP. Otherwise your call may have been mis-directed which will cause a delay in getting an emergency response.
